Manufacturers increase region's employment figures despite challenging conditions

This year's league table of the Top 50 SMEs operating in the manufacturing industry in the Sheffield City Region has 14 new entrants – most of which experienced substantial growth in turnover. Four firms outgrew the table reaching a larger business status.

The 50 companies included employ 6,824 people between them. Last year's employment figures for the companies in the table totalled 6,607, so 217 jobs have been created mainly in the Worksop, Matlock and Sheffield areas in the last year alone, which is positive news for the local economy.

Leading the new entrants for this year, and achieving second place overall in the table is Sheffield based Special Quality Alloys Limited. The firm manufactures and supplies nickel based super alloys and special steels and employs 100 people. The firm turned over £24.6 million and made £1.5 million profit before tax.

All of the firms in the Top 50 make such a valuable contribution to the region, with a combined turnover of £803 million, which is just very slightly less than last year's figure of £808 million. Unfortunately, profits made before tax this year are also down, totalling almost £58 million compared to £66 million last year.

It has therefore clearly been a challenging period for the businesses operating in manufacturing. This decrease has no doubt been fuelled by the impact of the oil and gas sector's downturn, as a high proportion of manufacturing in our region is part of the oil and gas supply chain.

Brexit has also had a negative effect on results – particularly for those businesses that import raw materials. On the flip side, those exporting may feel a slight uplift in the future – next year's results will be able to tell us more.

Topping the table this year is Matlock based Breasley Pillows Ltd. The firm has been established for over 40 years, employs 208 people, and is the UK's largest independent foam converter and bedding manufacturer. With a 0.5% turnover increase to $\mathfrak{L}24.9$ million, the firm climbed from its second place position last year to head the table this year.

So, despite the challenging conditions and threats of future volatilities ahead, there are some really positive stories to tell from the region's manufacturing SMEs. Whether its bedding, alloy wheels, garage doors, windows, turbocharger repair parts, chemical products, steal, cables, textiles, plastics, furniture or vehicle and engineering components - the list goes on and on - and shows what a fantastic range of SMEs we have, all working hard to manufacture muchneeded products and create jobs for people in our region.



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Grant funding - what is available for manufacturers?

You have to be a manufacturer to get grants these days don't you? often heard and certainly not true, however this is a sector which should definitely not overlook the potential for grants and public sector support.

We are privileged in our region to be home to many successful manufacturing companies which support the local and UK economy and contribute significantly to UK exports. We at BHP understand the operational and financial demands faced by manufacturers who have an ongoing requirement to invest in capital (property, plant, IT), invest in keeping their products and processes ahead of the competition (research and development) and invest in their staff (recruitment, retention and training).

There are real opportunities in SCR for support in this sector and a willingness to use the funds to accelerate growth. Locally the place to start is the SCR Growth Hub (www. scrgrowthhub.co.uk) which is the central point for our region's main support schemes and we work with the Growth Hub team to support our clients in making those applications as strong as possible. The Business Investment Fund (BIF) supports capital investment/job creation projects and can support some research and development (R&D) activity, there are R&D programmes

via the universities (Sheffield Innovation Programme), a significant training 'pot' through Skills Bank along with export support through the Department of International Trade. Nationally there is a central hub for R&D support (www.gov.uk/government/organisations/innovateuk) which has schemes specifically for the manufacturer.

So there are many schemes and then there are the hoops to jump through and then there's the paperwork and the jargon where to start? An early discussion with an experienced advisor can identify any key issues upfront (are you too big, too small, wrong postcode, doing the wrong thing,) and help identify the different schemes which are specifically relevant to you. It may be that you are a small autonomous subsidiary of a large international group – group size can impact on the support available but does not necessarily exclude you. The key is to have a clear strategy for what you want to do and then match

the relevant schemes to your plan and present it in the best way. Having someone who knows the 'rules' can save you time, give you the best chance of success and let you get on with the day job!

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How to benefit employees without adding to the wage bill

As typical employee pay increases over the last few years have been generally low, many employers are exploring ways of giving their employees more, without necessarily adding to the wage bill - which comes with a 13.8% Employer NIC charge.

Introducing a Pension Salary Sacrifice arrangement will reduce employers' NIC costs and will also benefit employees. The sacrifice reduces the amount of NIC payable, which results in a modest net pay increase and there is no effect on the amount of pension savings. From April 2018, the minimum rate of auto enrolment contributions goes up, so any employee currently paying a 1% pension contribution will see a threefold rise in their auto enrolment pension contributions. Employer minimum contributions will rise from 1% to 2% and a pension salary sacrifice will temper some of that cost.

Childcare is always a concern for parents. If you have a childcare voucher scheme in place, businesses should make sure everyone is aware of it as from April next year, all voucher schemes close to new

entrants. Those in the scheme will still be able to benefit from tax and NIC savings of up to £892 a year though and there is still time to open a new scheme.

Health benefits are a great way of giving employees peace of mind as well as looking after their welfare. These usually come with a benefit in kind attached, but by the time the employee has reclaimed an eye test or dental check-up for example, their savings outweigh the tax cost. These kind of packages often provide additional benefits too.

Any rewards for hard work tend to be taxable, either as salary or a benefit in kind; but something many businesses overlook is that they can make use of the Long Service Award. It has to be for service of over 20 years, with no previous award in the last 10 years, but this award can be up to £50 per year of service, and is tax free. It can't be paid in cash, but gifts and gift vouchers are acceptable.

The key to employee benefits is making sure the benefit matches the workforce's needs. If they don't use it, forget about it, or don't even know it's there in the first place, then it's been a waste of time. One way of addressing this is to run a staff survey to see what employees really want. It could be something as simple as a better brand of coffee or biscuits in the canteen!

Finally – Christmas! It's always best to keep gifts trivial, a gift or voucher under £50 per employee is tax free, but not if it's in cash. The taxman certainly doesn't down tools for the festive season!



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
