




# An outstanding performance by yorkshire's top 100 SMEs

I am delighted to report yet another year of outstanding performance from the Top 100 SMEs in the region. As usual in this survey, there are significant changes in the makeup of the Top 100, so rather than a direct comparison between the years, it gives us more of a general indication of regional performance, and it's looking very positive.

With a total turnover increase of 14%, and more importantly a 32% increase in profit before tax, employment is also on the up with an 11% increase. In total, Yorkshire's Top 100 SMEs now employ 10.6k people.

What is also encouraging is that these figures cover a period that included the initial shock waves brought about by the Brexit vote in June 2016. The significant impact on exchange rates that followed the vote benefitted exporting businesses, but those with an import element were hit hard by the increase in raw material costs which were often difficult to immediately pass on to customers.

A large proportion of those businesses falling out of the table cited Brexit for hurting their performance. In the future it will be interesting to see whether it will reverse the impressive performance of those firms operating within the service industry for example, if the larger corporations consider a move into mainland Europe, but only time will tell.

The service industry actually experienced the highest levels of growth, with a £37m increase in profit before tax, and increase in employees of 488. This was followed by the wholesale, manufacturing and retail sectors respectively.

The survey shows there are plenty of new businesses qualifying for the Top 100, with half the companies making the list for the first time, 13 of which are due to the new size limit definition of an SME, so this year's table therefore captures larger companies in the region. Manufacturing firm Benjn R Vickers & Sons, which makes lubricants, falls into this category and takes the top spot this year.

All of the top 10 businesses from last year remain in the table, with one of those companies moving up the ranks - Silkstone Finance Limited. Businesses from the manufacturing sector dominate the top four slots and there are 31 manufacturing firms in total included in the Top 100. 44 services businesses feature, with the highest placed being Pure Retirement Ltd in seventh place, and there are 11 wholesale businesses, with A-Fax Limited being ranked the highest in its sector in fifth place. The retail sector has the smallest representation, with just nine businesses making it into the Top 100, but the fashion shop Joe Browns, which has recently opened in Meadowhall shopping centre in Sheffield, has secured a high level position in eleventh place.

The overall results generated by all of the Top 100 companies in this year's table combine to create a hugely impressive level of growth and employment, despite uncontrollable factors like Brexit, and we are confident that our region's SMEs will continue to adapt to any future challenges that lay ahead to keep on delivering such outstanding results.

## Yorkshire is a land of opportunity for business

Our latest Top 100 table is made up of a vast range of SMEs, involved in all types of business activities, from cosmetic wholesalers to casino operators and holiday parks to professional service firms, which ultimately reinforces what a fantastic place Yorkshire is to do business in

All these SMEs clearly take pride in what they do and deliver quality products and services, as well as innovating when it comes to product Research and Development (R&D), which is an area where forward thinking companies, that arm themselves with good advice, continue to benefit from generous tax breaks. Similarly, businesses investing in new plant and machinery can take advantage of further tax relief in the form of Annual Investment Allowance (AIA). BHP has secured more than £13million in R&D tax relief for businesses in the last 5 years. However, it's estimated that approximately half of SMEs that are eligible for these tax breaks fail to take advantage of them.

One part of Yorkshire that is certainly seeing its fair share of technology investment is the Advanced Manufacturing Park near Rotherham, which is flying high after work recently got underway on Boeing's new production facility, as well as a £50 million factory for McLaren. The supercar firm estimate that the factory, which will produce carbon fibre chassis for its cars, will create 200 jobs once it's fully operational in 2019 and will generate approximately £100 million for the regional economy and its supply chain over the next decade.

Equally Leeds is also creating its own specialist area of expertise, quickly establishing a reputation as a key digital hub both in Yorkshire and beyond. The city is now widely recognised as one of the best places in the UK to carve out a digital career and already employs more than 23,000 people within the sector.

This push to continually make improvements, find better ways of doing things and establish areas of expertise can be characterised by the grit and determination commonly associated with Yorkshire folk. Plus, when this is combined with the opportunities that the county continually presents and nurtures, it's undoubtedly a wonderful place for businesses to thrive and prosper.

One such opportunity could be a historic devolution deal for Yorkshire. We're now in a position where 18 of Yorkshire's local councils are committed to a 'One Yorkshire' plan, whilst Sheffield and Rotherham have already reached their own agreement, although it's yet to be implemented.

Looking at other key UK cities that have successfully elected mayors and devolved both power and funding, including Birmingham and Manchester, it's clear there could be major benefits for Yorkshire. The county's economy is currently worth an estimated £110billion and supporters of such an agreement say this could climb to £200billion in 30 years, if a deal can be agreed, which makes it difficult to ignore.

## **Alternative exit options**

A strategy to realise the capital value built up in a business is essential for all owners, no matter the size of the company.

There are a breadth of options available to realise capital value - the most recognised being a trade sale or a sale to a management buy-out team. But there are other choices too - a middle ground which doesn't necessarily involve a full exit and therefore may appeal to owners at different stages of the business lifecycle.

One such option might be for a business owner whose company is on a strong growth path to de-risk their personal position. They could realise, in cash, some of the value they have built up in the company whilst at the same time retaining a significant shareholding to allow them to benefit from any uplift in future value.

Another scenario could involve the retirement of a business partner or

family member. This could be achieved by sourcing an investor who is keen to support the transaction, as well as the future direction of the business with both finance and expertise. This might also afford an opportunity to incentivise members of the second tier management team, by bringing them into the equity.

There is a significant amount of private capital available looking for a 'good home'. Thus, for SMEs like those in the Top 100, there are plenty of opportunities. The capital available comes in many different forms and can be used to support an evergrowing range of possible transactions, now more so than ever before. It's therefore a good time to explore the routes available by working with corporate finance and tax advisors to help put in place structures which provide a successful outcome for the shareholders.

Some business owners may be reluctant to engage with providers of capital as it means bringing in a third party, but in our experience, many such providers are patient, intelligent investors who work hard to support the investee company. They generally provide oversight and strategic assistance as well as opening up their network to the business owner to support growth and business development. This route isn't right for everyone, but there is often a suitable solution out there, and finding the right individuals to be involved with your business is as important as finding the right capital solution.

To qualify for inclusion, businesses must: • be an independent company OR the ultimate holding company of a UK group • be an SME, i.e. meets two of the following measures – less than 250 employees – less than £18m gross assets • not be a charity, academy, Limited Liability Partnership or listed Public Limited Company • be up-to-date filing accounts at Companies House • have a registered or primary trading address in Yorkshire and Humberside. NOTE: Due to the way in which regions are allocated in Fame, some neighbouring towns to the region have also been included in this survey. For financial periods of more than or fewer than 52 weeks, the figures have been annualised on a pro-rata basis. Private company information can be incomplete: in preparing this table every reasonable effort has been made to ensure that no qualifying companies have been omitted. In certain circumstances the compilers of the table have made exceptions to the qualification criteria and their decision is final.

## North

North Yorkshire companies continued to expand their presence in the overall ranking, this time claiming 13 of the 100 places. Property developer S Harrison Group came out top, increasing turnover by 80% and profits by a whopping 87% [to £5.3m]. The York-based company has recently expanded its area of operations and managing director Ann Scott said the results represented a return on the development of relationships outside its Yorkshire heartland. She added, "We keep overheads low but the quality of our salaried staff is exceptionally high. Most of our small but very skilled team of 10 have worked together for many years and we complement this with a large number of consultants and construction resources. Ultimately, every one of these attributes plays a significant role in our financial results."

Engineering features strongly in the list. Ripon based snowplough-maker Econ Engineering claimed third place after profits slipped slightly to £4.6m, and Emsley Crane Hire rose up the North Yorkshire table from eighth to fifth place after increasing profits by 14% to £3.2m. In between them, came Bramall Properties, which is led by none other than Tony Bramall, the Lookers car dealership entrepreneur who routinely crops up in motoring industry rich lists.



The fastest riser in the subregion was Ingenuity Digital Holdings, otherwise known as IDHL Group, which is a newcomer to the Top 100 and claimed 56th place. It incorporates digital marketing companies, such as Harrogate's WMG (one of the biggest names in SEO) and London-based Ingenuity Digital, plus Leeds-based web designers NetConstruct and Pinpoint Designs. Interestingly, the group is based at BeckwithKnowle in Harrogate – just a stone's throw from Cardale Asset Management and Bramall Properties. Another débutant was Harrogate-based Techbuyer, which buys, refurbishes and sells business IT equipment. Set up in 2005, it now employs over 100 people and has offices and warehouses in the UK, Germany and the USA. Funnily enough, founder and MD Kevin Towers cut his IT teeth at InTechnology, a tech company founded by Freeserve pioneer Peter Wilkinson – and also based at BeckwithKnowle.

## South


Leading the way is Silkstone Finance, the holding company for Ultima Kitchens. The Barnsley company was founded in 1982 by Alf and Clare Ellis, who had failed to find a kitchen they liked and so made their own. The company, which now employs over 200 people, has shot up the listing in recent years, reaching 10th place in the overall ranking last year. This time around, its profits are truly stellar, having risen by 71% (turnover jumped by 65%) to reach £7.5m – making it the second-most profitable SME in Yorkshire.

No South Yorkshire ranking would feel complete without some steel in it, and second placed Abbey Group fits the bill nicely, with profits of £6.2m. Machine knife manufacturer TGW is also doing the Steel City's heritage proud, turning last year's loss into this year's £4.1m profit, to take 25th place in the overall ranking and seventh in South Yorkshire. Haywood & Padgett raced up the ranking last year from 53rd to sixth place and this year comes a very creditable eighth - or third in the sub-region - with a 22% jump in profits to £5.5m. Not bad for a 30-yearold company whose product range is made up entirely of scones.

Glass Recycling has become a fixture in this ranking, and this year claims 14th place regionally and fourth in South Yorkshire, with profits up 10% to £4.6m. Industrial roofing company Moorhen Holdings and equipment hire firm Clee Hill Plant – both based in Chesterfield – pulled in £4.5m and £4m in profits respectively.

If you're puzzled by the presence of Derbyshire-based companies in the ranking, don't be – the north of the county is included within Sheffield City Region, so businesses based there qualify.

Daniel Sowden, partner at BHP, which produced the rankings contained in this year's Top 100 supplement, astutely points out that the high levels of investment in technology seen at the cutting edge Advanced Manufacturing Park in the region, are reaping significant dividends following the arrival in the region of the likes of Boeing and McLaren. The knock-on effect of this activity could prove to be a hugely exciting and prosperous boon to a region which created – and continues to create – some of the most innovative products in the world.







#### **East**

Hull's year as City of Culture 2017 appears to have given East Yorkshire an economic shot in the arm. Turnover among the East Yorkshire companies included in the top 100 increased over the year by almost 12%, while employee numbers rose by nearly 15%. More impressive still, profits across the sub-region leapt by 34%. What's more, this was in spite of a downturn from last year's stellar performance by its leading player.

Goole-based EOF Holdings made £7.6m in profits last year. but couldn't sustain such brilliance. This year it made £5.9m in profits - a 23% decrease - and the company, better known as Elite Office Furniture, fell three places in the overall ranking. Altia Holdings, which trades as Kelkay, supplies garden landscaping products such as paving and aggregates. Like EOF, it's based at Goole, but it also has a manufacturing and distribution site near Snaith. It increased turnover and headcount, and grew profits by 11% to £4.7m. As a result, it rose up the regional table, from 45th to 13th place. Its healthy performance in recent years has not gone unnoticed, and last week it announced that it had been bought for a cool £40m by Griffon Corporation. The £2bn US public company is part of The AMES Companies, the largest supplier of non-powered lawn and garden tools in the US, Canada and Australasia. Managing director Antony Harker said: "This is a very exciting time for Kelkay and it represents a major step forward for the business, the whole team and our customers. AMES has a major focus on developing their business in the UK. It is flattering that they have chosen to make Kelkay a key partner and investment opportunity to help them achieve their goals."

As usual, the leisure industry was well represented in the subregion's top 10 – by Flower of May Holiday Parks in Bridlington and Atlas Leisure Homes in Hull, which made £3.4m and £3.3m in profits respectively. But perhaps the most eyecatching performance came from Driffield-based JSR Farms. The family-run arable and pig farming business turned a £402,000 loss last year into a £3.3m profit – one of only three companies among the region's top 100 to have pulled off such a feat, and the only one in East Yorkshire.





### West

Yorkshire's economic powerhouse produced four of the region's top 10 SMEs, including its best performer.

Benjn R Vickers & Sons specialises in marine and textile lubricants and is more widely known as Vickers Oils. It saw profits dip just below the £8m mark, but still came in over half a million pounds more profitable than its closest contender in the region. Incredibly, it is only 10 years away from its 200th anniversary, and is run by the fifth generation of the Vickers family. Sewtec started life 1897 as the Singer sewing machine company's design and development team and last year was Yorkshire's most profitable SME. It comes in third place this time, having turned in profits of £6.8m. This was a 40% decrease on last year's stellar performance.

Elland-based A-Fax harnessed the strength of its A-Safe brand to increase turnover by 49%, mainly through continued development of its overseas markets in Europe, the USA and elsewhere. A pioneer in its niche, it makes the kind of strong but flexible barriers that prevent accident and injury in car parks, airports and warehouses (think reversing forklifts) and has an impressive roster of high-profile clients, including BMW, Jaguar Land Rover, DHL, Amazon and Heathrow and Singapore airports. Helped along by the weakened pound, A-Fax grew its profits to £5.9m – a very healthy looking increase of 157%.

The increasing popularity of equity release products is evidenced by the ongoing success of Leeds provider Pure Retirement. More than £3bn was borrowed in the UK using equity release plans last year – a new record, according to the Equity Release Council – and Pure Retirement was one of the beneficiaries. The company, which just last week had three of its financial products awarded five stars in the Moneyfacts Equity Release Star Ratings 2018, rose up the ranking from 34th to seventh place, having increased turnover by 82% and boosted profits by 88%, to £5.7m. There were several newcomers to the top 10, including Skipton Properties, Woodlands Homecare and Collett Holdings – a property developer, timber building retailer and haulage contractor respectively.

# A tax efficient way to share and share alike

With the UK preparing for Brexit, many business owners and SMEs are naturally considering how they will be affected by the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead.

One certainty during such periods of uncertainty, is that it's vital to tie top talent into a business because so often, it's ultimately people that make the difference, helping to set a company apart from its competitors.

One of the best ways of locking the best people in, and indeed attracting new talent, is by dangling the carrot of shares in the business, or offering a share option incentive, which enables an employee to buy a certain number of shares at a fixed price, at a future date.

There are various tax efficient ways of doing this, with one of the most popular share option incentives being the Enterprise Management Incentive [EMI] scheme. This is a tax favoured HMRC arrangement, specifically for smaller trading companies with growth potential and it can offer significant tax and National Insurance Contributions [NIC] savings for both employers and employees. As part of the scheme, key people can be granted EMI options, over shares worth up to £250,000 at any time. Companies can grant EMI options up to a total value of £3million.

The fact Income Tax and NIC is not usually payable on EMI options is a key tax advantage and a corporation tax deduction, equivalent to the amount of gains realised by employees, may be available subject to meeting the necessary conditions. However, 10% Capital Gains Tax is payable on disposal of the shares if Entrepreneurs' Relief applies.

It's important to note EMI schemes relate to ordinary shares that are non-redeemable and fully paid up. The company must also operate mainly within the UK, not be a subsidiary of another company, have fewer than 250 full time employees and gross assets of £30 million or less, when the EMI options are granted. EMI options also cannot be granted to employees who already control 30% or more of the company's ordinary share capital.

Qualifying companies can grant EMI options to any number of employees, as long as they work at least 25 hours per week, or for at least 75% of their total working time. The option must be exercised within a 10 year period and can commonly be subject to performance conditions being met, during an exit of the company, or at another agreed point.

For both employers and employees that meet the criteria and seek expert advice in executing EMI schemes, they offer plenty of flexibility and are a tried and tested way of incentivising, rewarding and retaining top talent.
